Dr. Ignatius Donnelly undertakes to show that the Chicago fire and other like burnings of about that time. were caused, or rather aggravated, after the first ignition, by the near approach of a comet to the earth. The substance of his theory was

that the earth had encountered, in that part of her orbit, the matter comprising the train of a cometary body at that period near its perihelion. This attenuated matter he supposed to be peculiarly and extremely inflammable. and yet capable of admixture with the earth's atmosphere.
