When section 7 was taken up the great battle commenced. Two reports and two sections (7) on the same subject, from the Committee, were taken up. The majority report is as follows: "Section 7. No county shall hereafter give or loan its money, property or credit to, or in aid of any individual, company, corporation or association, for the purpose of paying the property tax payers thereof, being legal electors therein and voting thereon, vote therefor, at an election to be held for such purpose and in no case shall the amount to be voted exceed in the aggregate four per cent of its assessed value for county and state purposes, as shown by its assessment next preceding such election."
