New tickets are being named every day; one of the latest is Sprague or Thompson, of Tacoma, for governor; Howlett, of North Yakima, for lieutenant governor; Wilson, of Spokane, for congress; Squire of Seattle, and Brents of Walla Walla, for senators. Ferry, of Seattle, is also in the field for governor.

President Hoyt has not yet made up his mind to run for one of the supreme judgeships. He likes banking best. Judge Calkins, of Spokane, and Judge Turner, of the same place, both prominent republicans, who lately have been attacked personally by a leading organ of the territory, are both possibilities for the United States senate.
