First County Convention for the Nomination of State Legislators.

Thursday, August 29, 1889, will be a red-letter day in the history of Lewis county. On this day was held the first county convention for the nomination of state senators and representatives to a state legislature. The result is worthy of joy. The Republicans have nominated for party leaders in the important battle men in every way worthy of a following by the whole people, and under their leadership Lewis county will help swell the tide of Republican victory.

The Lewis county Republican convention called to order by Hon. J. H. Long Chairman, who read the call as published, and announced that the first thing in order would be the election of temporary officers.

N. B. Coffman of Chehalis being nominated as temporary chairman received the unanimous vote of the convention, and M. L. Lewis of Winlock was unanimously elected secretary.

On motion the chair appointed the following as committee on credentials: E. B. Moore, Thomas Buchanan, A. B. Balch, C. W. Maynard and G. W. Denny.

A committee on permanent organization and order of business was appointed as follows: J. R. Welty, G. S. Rice, W. T. Byham.

Committee on platform: O. H. Joy, W. A. Reynolds, Wm. Van Wort, T. B. Mitchell, W. S. Pattison.

On motion the Convention adjourned until one o'clock p. m.

The report of committee on credentials was submitted, read and approved.

On Motion Pascal Morgan, delegate from Hanaford, was allowed to present credentials and on motion was admitted to seat in convention.

On motion delegates were allowed to cast ballots for delegates not present from their precincts.

comment the wisdom of the convention in submitting, as separate articles, to the people, the questions of woman suffrage and prohibition.

Deeming the coming election to be the most important likely to be held in the history of the state we recommend a thorough and efficient organization of republicans throughout the county.

Report of committee on order of business was adopted.

W. A. Reynolds in an earnest speech nominated for State Senator Hon. J. H. Long.

On motion Hon. J. H. Long was declared the nominee of this convention by acclamation.

Mr. Long being called out thanked the convention for the honor and pledged his whole ability towards Republican success.

He made an earnest plea for party harmony and fealty. The end in view was Republican success, not the advancement of any individual.

Motion for an informal ballot for representatives carried, only a few voting.

Tellers were appointed as follows: Taylor, Chas. Johnson, Balch, Kedy.

S. G. Rice nominated for one representative, Charles Gilchrist of Centralia. Mr. Reynolds ably seconded the nomination.

M. L. Lewis, of Winlock, in a short and energetic speech placed Hon. S. C. Herren, of Winlock, in nomination for representative.

Mr. Lewis stated he had canvassed almost the entire southern portion of Lewis county and found the people in favor of Mr. Herren's nomination.

Welly said it gave him pleasure to second this nomination. Mr. Herren had at the last election worked and talked for the Republican ticket and did much for its success.

Mr. Herren had all the qualifications requisite for an able and conscientious representative.

Mr. Michell nominated Mr. E. P. McClure for representative.

E. P. McClure stated that he was not a candidate for anything.

An informal ballot for representative being taken resulted as follows: Herren, 40; McClure, 17; Gilchrist, 58; Van Wort, 4.

On motion convention proceeded to regular nomination.

On motion the nomination of Charles Gilchrist for representative was made unanimous by acclamation.

On motion S. C. Herren was declared the second nominee for representative by acclamation.

Mr. Herren was called for and made an eloquent speech thanking the convention for the honor. He realizing we are approaching a campaign of great responsibility and desired that Republicans work unanimously and rise above any or all personal or private feelings.

He had confidence that the Republican ticket would be duly elected.

Nominations for clerk being in order. Siler nominated C. F. Curtis, of Toledo. O. H. Joy nominated D. W. Cameron, of Centralia.

No further nominations being made the convention proceeded to ballot for county clerk, Mr. Curtis receiving 21 and Mr. Cameron 36 votes.

Curtis moved that Cameron's nomination be made unanimous, which was done.

On the second ballot the following were elected delegates to the state convention at Walla Walla: E. P. McClure, J. H. Long, W. T. Forrest, N. B. Coffman, G. S. Rice, James Urquhart, Jr., F. M. Lewis, Charles Johnstone, O. H. Joy.

S. C. Herren offered a resolution instructing the delegates for E. P. Ferry for governor. The matter of instructing was opposed by many, but the following substitute to Herren's resolution, offered by Hon. J. H. Long, was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, By the Republicans of Lewis county, in convention assembled, that we are in favor of the nomination of ex-Governor E. P. Ferry for governor of our new state.

That we recognize in him great ability, experience and a firm determination of duty in things that are required to make a good governor.

Therefore, we ask our delegation at Walla Walla to use their best efforts to secure his nomination.

The following were then chosen as the Republican county committee.

CHEHALIS PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The New Building Completed—School Will Commence Monday Next.

The magnificent public school building which has been under course of construction in Chehalis since last fall has finally been completed and accepted by the directors of school district No. 3.

For several years after Chehalis had really outgrown the accommodations afforded by the old school house the building of a new one was delayed because the site owned by the district was too near the business portion of the city and it was almost impossible to obtain a suitable one at a fair price, or in fact at any price at all.

Finally about a year ago, Mrs. Barrett sold to the directors an acre of ground in the field north of the city limits for \$900. The old site was then sold at public auction, by which the district realized \$3,300, which was quite a start towards building the new house.

By vote of the district the directors were authorized to issue bonds to secure a loan of \$5,500 more, and a contract was entered into with C. W. McClure and others for the erection of a new school house to cost \$10,000.

The contractor commenced his task last fall, but the season being advanced work was suspended until spring, when it was again resumed, and to-day we behold its completion. The house contains large rooms, four on each floor, and will accommodate over 400 pupils.

A wide hall runs through the building from front to rear entrance, from which wide stairways lead up to the second story. Cloak rooms, recitation rooms, closets and other necessary adjuncts of a first class modern school house adjoin each class room and hall.

The windows are large and ample, and a perfect system of ventilation has been provided throughout the house. The entire building will be heated from furnaces in the basement.

This building is altogether one for Chehalis to be proud of, and its completion is a monument to the energy and faithfulness of the directors, G. W. Long, W. T. Forrest and D. C. Millet, who have given it much of their valuable time and labored hard for months in the interest of the people, watching with jealous eyes the work in all its stages that the house should be completed in the best possible manner for the money.

THE FIRST SCHOOL TERM. Monday, September 2d, the first term in the new house will begin. The teachers are: J. T. Forrest, principal; Mr. Kernodle, grammar department; Mrs. Newhouse, 1st primary; Miss Eva Amsden, 2d primary. Pupils will be received from outside the district on payment of tuition of \$5 per quarter in the principal's room, and \$3 per quarter in the other rooms, and may enter at any time. Payment can be made to either J. T. Forrest, the principal, or W. A. Westover, district clerk. Besides the regular branches the principal will teach Latin, algebra and bookkeeping to those who desire it. These terms are published on authority of the directors.

It is the intention to make the Chehalis public schools as thorough in their work as possible, and when pupils have succeeded in mastering all they can be taught here they will be fitted for active business or ready to attend college.
