Council committee on Fire Department and Water a dangerous nuisance, or become more than half destroyed by fire, the said commit-tee shall cause notice to be served upon the owner or person having control thereof, rewith, which must be done within ten days thereafter, and any person violating this sec-tion shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable on conviction as in Sec. 3 of this Ordinance, and upon conviction of any per-son under this section, the court shall direct the City Marshal forthwith to tear down or second a nich building and the cost thereal the City Matshal forthwith to tear nown or remove such building, and the cost thereof shall be paid in the first instance by the city, but the same same shall be taxed and recov-ered off the detendant as part of the costs in

ered off the detendant as part of the costs in such action.


