The big mill, owned by the Michigan Lumber Co., started up for the winter's run last Wednesday. This mill has a capacity of 75,000 feet of lumber a day, running the planer, lathe, saws, etc. This mill is complete in every way and is the finest in this section of the country. There are now 21 men employed in the mill, but this is not a full crew, although most of the work inside the mill is done by machinery, this number is men employed in the mill and does not include teamsters, etc. This is not the only employment this mill creates, it will make more logging camps, more work on the railroad and another logboat and more cars, as with the present number they cannot keep the mills supplied. Ships will come to Vancouver to load lumber and bring goods from other ports, and thus in many ways this mill will benefit the city. A RAILROAD TO THE SOUTH. Mr. C. J. Smith, general manager of the O. R. & N. Co., who has just returned from a visit to the south, was yesterday interviewed by a reporter in regard to a rumor that the Union Pacific railroad company is about to build a line between this city and Hazel Sound. In answer to inquiries addressed to him, Mr. Smith admitted that the Union Pacific has surveys in the field between Portland and the Sound, and expects to build such a line. The company expects to reach by rail the most important points, and in connection with its sound steamers, all points on Puget sound some excellent boats, and is arranging to increase the number and add materially to the service. The new boats will be especially adapted in point of speed and accommodations to the business, and will make water travel on Puget sound the speediest and most comfortable on the Pacific coast.—Oregonian, Sep. 27

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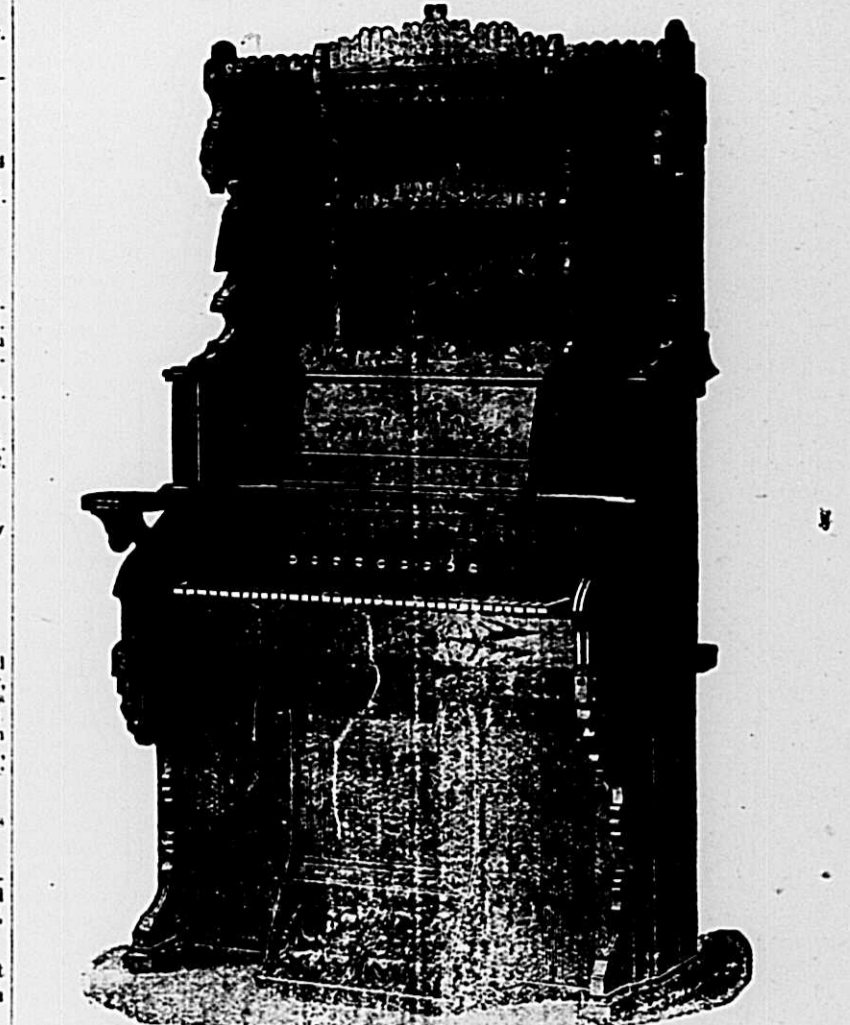
