CONSTITUTION.

In a total vote of 52,031 for and against the constitution the majority in favor is 28,273. Twenty-nine counties ranging from 63 in Asotin county voting against it were; Columbia by a majority of 262 in a vote of 1198; Franklin, 46 majority in a vote of 116; Skamania, 71 majority in a vote of 127; Garfield, 207 in a vote of 893; Walla Walla, 446 in a total of 2408.
