The business portion of Seattle, only two short months ago swept away by fire, is rapidly rising from its ashes with increased beauty, and undoubtedly within a year or two will have no traces of its terrible disaster. So with Spokane. Before the ruins were cold desirable corner lots changed hands at one thousand dollars a front foot, and some of the finest buildings of the West are projected and will be built as fast as material can be obtained. Sad as was its misfortune we have no doubt that it will be turned, by its brave-hearted citizens, into a future blessing by having a more beautiful city and its future buildings better protected from fire than they have been. There need be no doubt about the future of places which have such brave hearts to rise above present disaster and natural resources to back them.

The civilization of the East is older, more crystallized, perhaps at present more cultured, than that of the great West; but there is being built up a social order in this Western empire which will astonish the world by its energy, intrepidity and rapid progress.

Table showing census data for Lewis County in 1889 and 1887, including total population, males, females, married, and single counts.

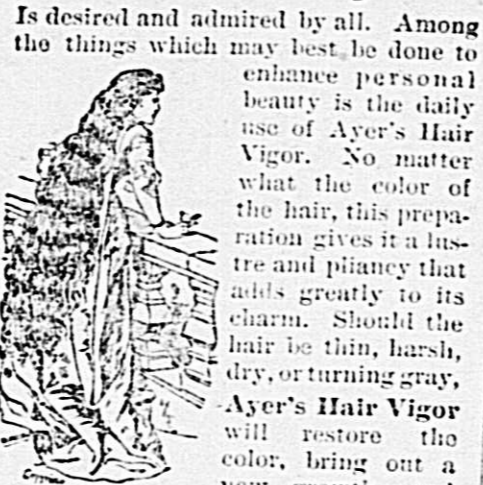
Notice to Bridge Contractors.

Notice is hereby given that until 10 o'clock p.m. of the 2nd of September, 1889, sealed proposals will be received by the undersigned for the construction of bridges to be built at the places named below. The said bridges to be of wooden, straining beam bridges, and to be covered.

One bridge 10 feet span, across North Fork of Nwankum river in section 3, tp 13 n, r 2 w. One bridge 90 feet span across South Fork of Nwankum river, near the Newwankum bridge, in section 1, tp 13 n, r 2 w. One bridge 80 feet span across Nwankum river in the residence of James T. Phillips, on Clatsop and Coville roads. One bridge 120 feet span across Skookumchuck river, on the newly located road leading from Centralia to Hanford road. One bridge 100 feet span across East Fork of Nwankum river, on Belvidere and Newwankum roads, as the same was recently changed on Belvidere road. With each bid must be deposited a bond with a penalty equal to ten per cent of the amount bid, conditioned that the bond shall be forfeited to the county if the party making such bid shall fail or neglect to enter into written contract and give requisite bond within five days from date of award.

On the day above named the contract or contracts for building said bridges shall be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder, reserving the right to reject any or all bids, and to accept any or all of them, at their discretion. The board of Commissioners of Lewis County, Wash.

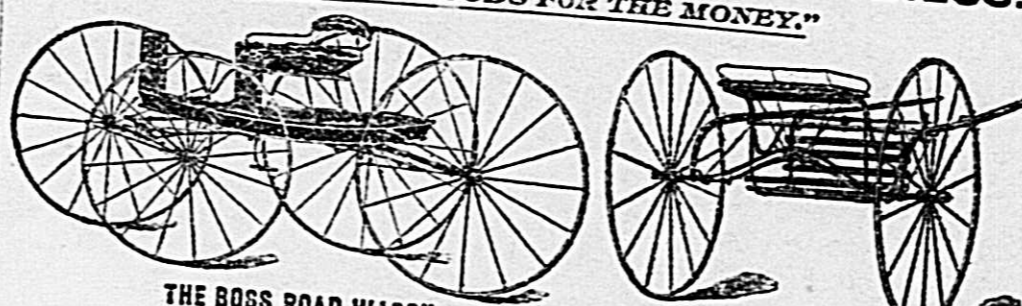
