

Mc- Most of the men, we are informed had families to support, and were negroes, without familes were unexpectedly precipitated upon Roslyn, and the white men were told that they were not wanted. The amount of suffering entailed upon these men and their helpless families by this heartless edict will perhaps never be told, but it may be easily imagined. The cause for the change is now apparent. The owners of the mines are republicans and monopolists. They laid their plans away ahead. Washington Territory was soon to become state. To control absolutely 500 votes was something they had to consider if they wished to retain their relentless grip on the commonwealth. The more ignorant men are, the more redily they can be ruled. But white men were not so easily controlled and were disposed to be independent factors when it came to exercising their vote, hence they were left out in the cold. Had the Chinaman been a voter it is reasonable to assume that he, and not the negro, would have been selected as a still more desirable tool. But the republican party has not as yet been able to bestow the power of suffrage upon the Mongolian, and hence he was ineligible for the purposes to which the 500 Roslyn miners were to be put.
