Cash entries during July for a day. final proofs show 35,152 acres; eash amounting to \$55,661. There will be formally opened about Nowere final proofs during August for 41,415 acres, the cash received being \$60,482. For September proofs were made for 34, 840 acres; cash receipts being \$65,-115. The total number of acres proved upon was 211,047 acres, eash receipts for same being \$181,-

The number of cash proofs during the quarter was 856.

The homestead final proofs are 457 in number, for 17,945 acres during July, 37,461 acres August, and 12,031 acres in September.

The total number of pre-emptions in the time was 468, amounting to about 56,000 acres of land.

The timber land applications were 151 in number, for about 20, 000 acres.

The receipts for fees and commissions will swell the total cash receipts by several thousand dollars.


