## NOTICE OF HEARING ON PETITION FOR REINSTATEMENT

Notice is hereby given that the petition of Pierce Lonergan for reinstatement to membership in Washington State Bar Association has been filed and that said petition will come on for hearing before the Board of Governors of Washington State Bar Association at its meeting to be held at the Davenport Hotel, Spokane, Washington, at the hour of 11:00 a. m. on the 19th day of May, 1945.

Mr. Lonergan resigned from membership in Washington State Bar Association on the 26th day of January, 1939, after conviction in the United States Courts upon a charge of violating the mail fraud statutes. His resignation was accepted by the Supreme Court on the 16th day of March, 1939.

### BAR BRIEFS

Members of the Washington State Bar Association are saddened by the passing of Judge William E. Campbell, veteran Grays Harbor jurist, who died at his home in Hoquiam, Washington, January 9, 1945. Judge Campbell was an alumnus of Stanford University and Harvard Law School, and had an active career at the bar before his elevation to the bench. He served two terms as prosecuting attorney for Grays Harbor County, during which he prosecuted the notorious murderer, Billy Gohl. He was elected to the Superior Court Bench in 1924 and served Grays Harbor County as one of its judges continuously from that date to the time of his death. He served two terms as president of the State Association of Superior Court Judges. Judge Campbell was of pioneer stock and was one of the first white children born in Grays Harbor County, the son of Edward Campbell, one of the founders of Hoquiam. His death is a great loss to the people of Grays Harbor and the entire State.

The Bar will be pleased to know that Mr. J. E. Stewart of Aberdeen was appointed by Governor Langlie to succeed Judge Campbell. Judge Stewart is an alumnus of Stanford and has had a long and distinguished career at the bar. He has been a leader in the activities of the Washington State Bar Association and served as its president in 1938.

It has been suggested that various local bar associations consider the idea of also supplying speakers from members of the bar who would address public groups on questions of general civic and national interest. This latter program could supplement the radio broadcasts which have been sponsored by the American Bar Association.
